Geography

Peru borders with Brazil, Ecuador, Bolivia, Colombia, and Chile. El Callao, its main port, is an important player in the Pacific Rim trade. Peru's area is of 496,000 square miles (1.28 million square kilometers). It's the 19th largest country in the world and the third largest in South America.

Peru's regions are the Coast, the Andes, and the Amazon. Each region is rich in resources thanks to its diverse territory and climate. In addition, Peru has territorial waters that reach 200 miles (320 kilometers) to the west.

Demographics

Peru's population is over 33 million. Despite political and social conflicts, Peru's economy remains the strongest in the region, highlighting the country's resilience.

Spanish, Quechua, and Aymara are the official languages of Peru, with over 90% of the population speaking Spanish. Additionally, over 70 native languages are spoken throughout the country.
